## Lieutenant Jubal Early: February 9, 2018

Lieutenant General Jubal Early served in the Confederate Army as a division commander under Stonewall Jackson and Richard Ewell. Referred to by Robert E. Lee as "my bad old man," Early was cantankerous, short-tempered, and aggressive, but his troops called him "Old Jube" or "Old Jubilee" with enthusiasm and affection. West Point graduate, lawyer, soldier and proudly unreconstructed rebel, Jubal Early was truly a man of his times.



## William Henry Harrison February 16, 2018

William Henry Harrison, Ol' Tippecanoe and the ninth President of the United States, spent most of his adult life in the Ohio Valley, specifically Cincinnati. Arriving in November 1791, Harrison would spend the rest of his life based out of the region. In 1821, Harrison finished his term as a member of the Ohio State Senate.

## George Hunt Pendleton February 23, 2018



George Hunt Pendleton was Southwestern Ohio's Congressman and Democratic Vice-President candidate with George McClellan running against President Lincoln. Today he is best remembered as the author of the Pendleton Act of 1883, requiring civil service exams for government positions. His house in Cincinnati is today a National Historical Landmark.

## Julia Grant March 2, 2018

The wife of the 18th president Ulysses S. Grant was not known as a great beauty, but rather a vivacious woman with a sparkling personality. She captured the heart of a West Point Cadet from Ohio and their love spanned over 40 years.

During times of turmoil, it was her strength and support that the General relied on. The untold love story of Ulysses and Julia is one that rivals Romeo and Juliet.



## Hellen Keller March 9, 2018

In the late nineteenth century, a little girl struggled out of the depths of fear. At age of two, Helen Keller experienced a life threatening illness.

She was plunged into a dark, silent world. Anne Sullivan, a determined young teacher would find the key to unlock Helen's prison.



Through Anne's diligence and perseverance, Helen would become a world renowned speaker and advocate for the disabled.

## Gen. Lew Wallace: Shiloh Solider March 16, 2018



General Lew Wallace was a Indiana self-taught artist, architect, soldier, inventor, and musician, but was most famous for his writing, "Ben-Hur", which was considered like a fifth gospel at the time and had a significant effect on Christianity and literature. Lew Wallace served in the Mexican War, Civil War and

helped overthrow the French in The Mexican Empire. Wallace is the only person honored for contributions to the arts with a statue in our nation's Capital building. Portrayed by Bernie O'Bryan, who has researched and depicted Wallace in film, stage and events.

## George A. Hatch March 30, 2018

Cincinnati's controversial mayor during the turbulent time of the American Civil War and an 1860's Democrat loyal

Union man from Massachusetts with sympathies towards Kentucky but not necessarily the south.

George A. Hatch, scared to death of riots, has a spectacular tale concerning the city's defense and his actions afterwards.
